The weather is finally starting to break, and spring is here!

We have received several requests from parents for students' homework due to planned vacations. Teachers have assignments on their SCHOOLOGY page. Students can access it at anytime and anywhere. It is the parents and students' choice whether to access Schoology while they are absent to keep up with work or do it when they return. In either case, students will have one day per day missed to make-up the work. Only school days count towards that total. For example - if a student misses 4 days of school and returns on Thursday, the student will have until the end of day, on Tuesday the following week to complete the work. If work is not returned by that day our "Homework Policy" will apply. Our homework policy states that students will have 5 days to submit work after the due date, however credit for late work will be reduced by 10% for each day late. Ex. 1 day late 10% reduction - 2 days late 20% reduction, etc.

Drop Off/Pick Up

If you drive your child to or from school, you will need to drive to the main parking lot. When you are dropping off your child, please pull all the way up to the last stop sign that is on the sidewalk. This keeps the traffic pattern flowing and traffic back-ups to a minimum. You may also drop off your child in the parking lot along Ashley Street. Please do not drive in the bus loop to drop your child off. Safety is the number one concern when driving around the school property.



Student Drop Offs

Upon a student's late arrival or when returning from an appointment, parents do not need to accompany the student back into the school. Students can bring in any doctor's notes, if necessary and sign themselves in where they will be given a pass and will head to class.



DRESS CODE

Anchor Bay Schools respect students' right to express themselves in the way they dress. All students who attend Anchor Bay Schools are expected to respect the school community by dressing appropriately for the K-12 environment. Students' attire should facilitate participation in the learning, health and safety of students and adults who supervise them. This policy is intended to guide students, staff, and parents.

The following guidelines shall be followed, which allow for student expression but also to aid in academic success and safety.

Guidelines shall prohibit student dress or grooming practices which:

- 1. Presents a hazard to the health and safety of the student or to others in the school.
- 2. Interfere with schoolwork, create disorder, or disrupt the educational program.
- 3. Cause excessive wear or damage to school property.
- 4. Prevent the student from achieving educational objectives because of blocked vision or restricted movement.

Inappropriate attire includes:

Profane, negative, or obscene writing or pictures

Sunglasses (unless prescription transitional lenses)

Hoods, or anything that covers the ears

Tube tops or single strap tops. Tops must have a strap on both shoulders Transparent clothing

Clothing that reveals undergarments

Clothing that exposes nipples, genitals, or buttocks

Clothing that has references to drugs, alcohol, tobacco, sex, gangs, illegal activities, demonstrates association—with hate groups, or uses hate speech targeting a protected class — may not be worn.

Footwear with a sole must be worn at all times.

Students who represent the district at an official or school sponsored function or public event (I.E. – athletic teams, band, choir, AFJROTC, etc.) may be required to follow specific dress requirements as a condition of participation or attendance. Specialized courses may require specialized attire such as sports uniforms or safety gear. I.E.- Physical Education and Career and Technical classes.

The administration at each school reserves the right to determine what constitutes appropriate dress.

Any student with inappropriate clothing will remain in the office until an appropriate solution is found. This may require a change of clothing to be brought to the school.



Protecting Our Water...It's as Easy as Seven Simple Steps

Did you know that over three million people depend on our lakes and streams for their drinking water? And that in Southeast Michigan there are over 300,000 registered boaters and 3.5 million people visit a local park each year?

With this many people depending on our lakes and streams for drinking water and recreation, we need to be careful how we treat our water. You might not be able to see the stream or lake from your house, but it's there. It might be a small stream or ditch or even a storm drain in the street. All of this leads directly to our lakes and streams. So, what we do at home affects our water!

Here are seven simple steps you can take in your home and yard to protect our lakes and streams

- 1. **Help keep pollution out of storm drains.** Storm drains lead directly to our lakes and streams. So, never dump oil, pet waste, leaves, dirty water, or anything down a storm drain. Remember, only rain in the drain.
- 2. **Fertilize caringly and sparingly.** Excess fertilizer that gets into storm drains pollutes our lakes by causing large algae blooms and using up oxygen fish need to survive. Sweep excess fertilizer back onto your lawn, use a low or no phosphorus fertilizer, and have your soil tested to see what, if any, fertilizer is needed.
- 3. Carefully store and dispose of household cleaners, chemicals and oil. Instead of putting hazardous products like antifreeze, motor oil and pesticides in the trash, down the storm drain or on the ground, take them to a local hazardous waste collection day.
- 4. **Clean up after your pet.** Whether on a walk or in your yard, promptly clean up after your pet. Not only will you be a good neighbor, you will also protect our water from harmful bacteria.
- 5. **Practice good car care.** Consider taking your car to a car wash or washing your car on the grass.
- 6. **Choose earth friendly landscaping.** Protect your pets, kids and environment by using pesticides sparingly. Also, water your lawn only when it needs it and choose plants native to Michigan.
- 7. **Save water.** Over watering our lawns can easily carry pollution to the storm drains and to our lakes and streams. Consider using a broom instead of a hose to clean · sidewalks and driveways. Direct hoses and sprinklers on the lawn, not the driveway. This will help save our lakes and streams and save you money.



Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- . Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- . By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- . By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10%, or 2 days of school a month, over the course of the school year, can drastically affect a student's academic success.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority

- · Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- · Help your children maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- . Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- If your children must stay home because they are sick, make sure they have asked teachers for resources and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

Help your teen stay engaged

- · Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
- Make sure your children are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies.
 If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor you child's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feet isolated.
- Encourage your child to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs.
- Notice and support your children if they are showing signs of arxiety, such as headaches
 or stomach aches. Listen to their concerns, and if needed, ask school staff for help.

Communicate with the school

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not adding up.
- . Seek help from school staff, other parents, or community agencies if you need support.
